First prize: £1,000; second prize: £500; third prize: £250. The top poems will be published in The Brilliant.



In both French and Spanish, students have been revising for their End of Year assessments with some

targeted revision lessons. It has been wonderful to see how well they know their vocabulary and grammar, and can translate in two tenses effectively during the revision tasks. We wish them all the best for their assessments next week: remember not to leave any gaps and always look for cognates. Use the four Cs: Context, Clues, Cognates and Common sense!

Year 9

In Year 9 French, students have just finished listening and reading key tasks, marking the end of module 2 "Mon Monde

et Moi". Students are now starting the topic of jobs and future aspirations, and today we started to identify and use modal verbs in the present tense. Further on in the module, students will learn to recognise and use simple future tense, talking about what they are going to be when they leave education, as well as using the conditional tense to describe their ideal jobs!

In Spanish, students have been describing their daily routines using reflexive verbs. Several Year 9 students have also completed home language GCSE speaking exams in French, Chinese, Modern Hebrew, Arabic and Italian. They were fantastic, confident and impressed the external speakers greatly.

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



Having completed listening, reading and translation papers for their Year 10 exam, Year 10 have all being doing deep DIRT on their work, celebrating successes, and looking at how to improve. They have been working on how to target specific exam questions using Miss

Coleman's Postman Pat van technique! It is amazing how a simple children's toy can significantly improve linguistic achievement on gap fill questions - all about how you cannot put a square peg in a round hole!

In Sixth Form, the Year 12s have begun revising for their upcoming exams after half-term, revisiting the work on La Casa de Bernarda Alba which is the cultural topic they have studied this year. Year 12 have also shown their support for their fellow students by helping the Year 13 with their speaking practice in lessons and using their debating skills to challenge their opinions.

Year 13 have completed their final A-level speaking exams this week; we have been so proud of the excellent effort and confidence with which they have approached these exams. 18 minutes of talking about topics ranging from Napoleon, to whether bullfighting should be banned, to unsolved murder cases in Spain, to the impact of social media on young people. They have worked extremely hard on their critical response and advanced structures. We wish them all the best with the rest of their exams.



#### Extremely Puzzled by P.J. Nichols Review by Max, Y7

This book is the 3rd of a series about a group of school children who find themselves in an adventure. When some of their friends and family are captured by assistant weather gods, they must work together to complete puzzles and riddles to save them. They must do this with no mistakes, or they also get captured. As they complete more challenges, they find it gets harder and harder.

The main character Peter is exceptionally good at puzzles but finds it easier working it out on his own. He finds his friends sometimes see things he does not which is why they are such a good team.

These puzzles take them all over their city, to a huge 12-storey hotel, different houses and they end up on a large mountain that they have needed to visit in previous books.

The puzzles and riddles are fun to try to work out before you find out the answer in the book. Some of the answers are in plain sight, some are tricky, and some may even shock you.

There is a bit of a slow start but as it got more exciting, I could not put it down. I liked it so much that I have already started reading the next book in the series: Incredibly Puzzled.

I would rate this book series 4.5 out of 5 (so far....).



After a moment of reflection, Mr Nouas remembered bragging rights were on the line, so he took initiative and tied up the scoring. Eventually, after a match which felt more like a war, Mr Lally was crowned the champion, winning 18-21.

# **Employer Talks**

This morning, Rosie Sims from Bristol Zoological Society (previously called Wild



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Place Project) came to talk to our students about the range of work they are doing in conservation. She talked in depth about the development of their new site near Cribbs Causeway and the goals the Society has for the future. She also talked about the numerous conservation projects the Society is working on and explained that over 80% of the species they have are endangered which is the key focus of their work.

Rosie then went on to talk about the variety of careers in which you can work with animals and in conservation, starting with the most obvious and popular, zoo keeping; she explained that this role involves very long hours and hard physical work but that it is incredibly rewarding. Other routes include veterinary medicine which is essential for the conservation of endangered species. There are also a huge range of other careers that are crucial for the smooth running of the Society, including fundraising, marketing, finance and hospitality. Great conservation work relies on donations and raising money through retail. She also gave students some great tips



about how they can get into these roles, including places they can volunteer to gain some experience. Students who attended will be able to access the slides from her presentation in their Unifrog accounts.
