**Industrial Cadets**

Over the last three months two teams of 'Industrial Cadets' have been designing a sustainable school building. The EcoEngineers and EnginEcos set about researching their brief by surveying students and staff, interviewing the finance department and analysing the blueprints of our school. Once they had determined environmental and sustainability issues which could be resolved they set about researching the best solutions. Their recommendations ranged from the high to low tech including a turf roof, green wall, remote controlled mood lighting, rain water harvesting and solar energy. They worked as teams, under the guidance of mentors from Airbus, to produce detailed 7000+ word reports on their recommendations. Yesterday they returned to Airbus to present their findings to the senior engineer assessors through a combination of 3d scale models, display board and spoken presentation, which was followed by a detailed questioning from the judges. All the students were outstanding ambassadors for the School and they performed incredibly well under pressure. This project has tested their time management, team working, leadership, research and presenting skills and they have all risen to the challenge.

**Pens for Poverty**

On Enterprise Day students ranging from Year 7 to Year 9 formed groups in which we had to come up with a business idea to raise money for a certain cause of our choosing. This was how we formed Pens for Poverty. Pens for Poverty is a student run business in which we sell stationery to students in Bristol Free School. All profits from the sales will go to less developed countries where student don't have enough money to buy their own school supplies.

After weeks of planning, we are pleased to announce that this business will be opening to all students on 3 May. We will be selling pens, pencils, protractors, compasses and exam ready pencil cases filled with suitable stationery. Please bring in money to spend on stationery!
