EMPLOYER TALKS

MS NORTON CAREERS LEAD

This morning we welcomed Laurence Ross from the NHS who talked to students about the huge range of careers available in the NHS from those that are more well known such as doctors and nurses, to the lesser-known roles including scientists, engineers, care support workers and IT specialists.


Laurence explained the variety of pathways available to get into roles in health and social care including through the traditional academic routes, as well as through apprenticeships. He told students about apprenticeships in a variety of roles including nursing and midwifery and gave advice to students about where to find the roles and how to apply.

What I found most interesting is that it is possible to move through a series of health and social care roles within a career. For example after completing a degree in nursing, it is possible to move on to a relatively new apprenticeship which makes it possible to train as a doctor.

He encouraged students to think less about choosing one specific career, but being open to consider how their career might move from one role to another in the NHS throughout their life.

ESU-Churchill Public Speaking Competition

In February, Bristol Free School hosted the Bristol and Bath branch final of the English-Speaking Union's Public Speaking Competition. With teams from St Bede's, Badminton, Collegiate, and QEH, we found it absolutely fascinating to hear the in-depth speeches from schools around Bristol, ranging from a review of the change caused by the #MeToo movement to how fiction can teach us more than life itself.

Both our teams did fantastically. For Team A, Emily gave a thought-provoking speech about how the foster care system is broken and ideas to fix it. Then Mark and Ellie, respectively, chaired and questioned another team's speech about the negative societal implications of undervaluing introverts. Ellie's questions cleverly probed into a large variety of areas and Mark gave a phenomenal concluding summary that reiterated the core points and how they were justified.



From BFS Team B, Jessica gave a speech deeply delving into the morals and implications of book banning on our subconscious. Rina then questioned a speech very relevant today on how universities should treat free speech, responding with some smart and intuitive questions pulling apart the topic. Zara opened and concluded the speech excellently, emphasising the key points and their arguments to the audience.

Both teams spoke eloquently and with enthusiasm and intelligence. We have all gained some truly helpful public speaking skills through this. Mr Harris was a brilliant MC throughout, demonstrating to us how public speaking skills can be useful in our futures. After much deliberation from the judges, we learnt that Emily had won the Best Speaker of this round due to her wonderfully worded, impactful speech and that BFS Team A had made it through to the southwest regional final. Who and what?

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The Association of British Science Writers invites students from non-selective state funded schools, or those who are home schooled with disabilities and who cannot attend school in person, aged 14-16 years, to submit an 800-word essay on any subject in science, technology, engineering and/or mathematics.

This competition is open to students nationally in England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales.

This competition is designed to get young people writing and thinking about the big questions in science, technology, engineering and maths, with a focus on how science impacts on policymaking and society.

Criteria for Entry:

- 1. You must be aged 14-16 years old;
- 2. You MUST be attending a state funded AND non-selective school in the UK.

Award Categories

In 2024 we are introducing five award categories to which you can align your essay to:

- Climate & Environment
- AI & Technology
- Engineering the Future
- Healthcare & Life Science
- Maths & Physical Sciences

Entries open from Monday 29 January. We have just extended our deadline until Monday 18 March at 5pm


Year 8



Mindfulness for Parents of SEND Children



Pause Soften Connect Be

A Mindfulness Course for parents and carers, which looks at how you deal with the stress and worry which comes from being in the role of a parent or carer of a child with additional needs.

This ten-week course allows parents to notice how you habitually react when under stress and how practising mindfulness techniques can help you to regulate your emotions more effectively, including becoming more resilient during stress. Therefore, you will become more able to pause, soften, connect with your breath and be in the moment with whatever difficulty that may be here. And then to respond more calmly and appropriately.

Evidence shows that when under stress, parenting skills are found to collapse. With Mindfulness for Parents, it's the parents' own stress and suffering, that is the primary focus of the training rather than the problem behaviour of the child.

Mindfulness for Parents/Carers supports you to:

- Reduce stress
 - Reduce harmful intergenerational patterns of stressed-out parenting
- Improve emotional regulation
- Improve family communication and relationships
