### Head Teacher Message

Congratulations to Year 10 students who have been sitting their GCSE mock exams over the last two weeks. I have been so impressed with their maturity and focus in exams and lessons. It is clear they have taken these exams very seriously and revised very hard. Over the next few weeks teachers will feedback to students how they have done. We plan to put in some targeted interventions during term 6 for those students who, from these exams, need more practice and to recap on topics covered so far.

Also, well done to Year 8 who have been doing inclass assessments this week too.



Over the last three days over 157 Year 9 students have embarked upon their practice Bronze Duke of



Edinburgh expedition. It has been very exciting watching them arrive in school with heavy backpacks and setting off in teams from The Tumps.

Our School has one of the highest rates of participation in the South West. We passionately believe in the scheme and the wider personal benefits to young people. Students return with new friends, greater confidence, and an appreciation of nature and the simple pleasures in life!

A big thank you to Mr Milstead and Mr Giles who lead the scheme and the many BFS staff who supported the overnight camp.

Tell us about the characters and plot - but no spoilers!






### **Engineering Club**



### Employer Talks



This morning we welcomed Mel and Suze from our catering company, Innovate, to talk to students about careers in the catering industry. They both talked about their route into catering, which for both began by working in the kitchen.



Suze talked about the apprenticeship route that she took into the industry, starting as a Level 2 apprentice (Level 2 Production Chef Apprenticeship). This involved working four days a week in a city restaurant and doing one day a week in college. She has since completed the Level 3 Team Leader Apprenticeship and is just finishing her Level 4 as a hospitality manager apprentice.

Both discussed the varying career routes that can be taken in the industry, other than food preparation, including business and finance, and nutrition, dispelling the myth that careers in food always involve working in a kitchen.

Suze left us some handouts about the apprenticeships that she took, so please speak to Ms Norton or our careers advisor, Ms Lyons, if you would like a copy.



### Mindfulness for Parents of SEND Children



### Pause · Soften · Connect · Be

A Mindfulness Course for parents and carers, which looks at how you deal with the stress and worry which comes from being in the role of a parent or carer of a child with additional needs.

This ten-week course allows parents to notice how you habitually react when under stress and how practising mindfulness techniques can help you to regulate your emotions more effectively, including becoming more resilient during stress. Therefore, you will become more able to pause, soften, connect with your breath and be in the moment with whatever difficulty that may be here. And then to respond more calmly and appropriately.

Evidence shows that when under stress, parenting skills are found to collapse. With Mindfulness for Parents, it's the parents' own stress and suffering, that is the primary focus of the training rather than the problem behaviour of the child.

Mindfulness for Parents/Carers supports you to:

- Reduce stress
- Reduce harmful intergenerational patterns of stressed-out parenting
- Improve emotional regulation
- Improve family communication and relationships

Bristol Autism Support is a charity that supports parents and carers of autistic children - with or without a diagnosis, of any age or support need.

We run a coffee morning fairly locally to BFS. These are informal gatherings where parents can share their feelings and get information and advice.

For the rest of this academic year, the North Bristol support groups will be at Grupo Lounge in Westbury-on-Trym village at 10am on the following Fridays:

26 April, 10 May, 24 May, 14 June, 28 June and 12 July

For people who have never attended one of our coffee mornings before, this is what to expect:

- You will know you've found the right group of people when you spot the A4 sized BAS logo on the table.
- There are usually 2 or 3 BAS volunteers sitting around the table. They will each be wearing a BAS lanyard, and someone will come and say hello and introduce themselves to you. They will ask what you would like to drink and order it for you. BAS pays for a drink for everyone, so enjoy!

All our team members have autistic children of their own so have lived experience to draw on. There will also be other parents and carers there too, like yourself. The numbers vary from week to week but it can be anything from 1 to 8 others.

People come to BAS coffee mornings for all kinds of reasons:

- To ask for advice and support. If a volunteer can't advise you, they'll usually be able to signpost you to someone who can.
- To chat to other parents and carers of autistic children and share their experiences with people who understand.
- To meet others and make new friends.
- To feel seen and heard.

There's no pressure to share anything, unless you want to. The volunteers and other parents and carers are very friendly and the atmosphere is incredibly supportive.
