Words from the Headteacher

I have been asked many questions about 'free schools' by many people since I've been Headteacher of BFS. The people asking have ranged from parents to politicians, journalists to academics, family to friends. Each has had a perspective they have brought to their questions and a few have had agendas, some worthy others not so. To all questions I consider my answers carefully, however, I am most often asked are "What is a Free School?" and "How are you different from other schools?"

The answer I tend to give involves an analogy: the United States of (and in) America are united by a common currency, the dollar, and ultimately answerable to the White House, but beyond this each state is vastly different from the next; from California to Georgia to New England. Does this comparison stretch to Free Schools in England? Perhaps: we are a Free School and very different from the many which opened in 2011 and those which have opened since. However, like all state schools we are ultimately answerable to the Department for Education, but what is our common currency? In other words, what is it that truly matters? The answer to this question extends beyond Free Schools and applies to all schools. We have Free Schools, Academies, Maintained Schools, University Technical Colleges, Studio Schools. We have a new curriculum, exam reforms, and new Ofsted frameworks. We have industrial action alongside changes to work and pensions. All in all we are in fairly turbulent times when it comes to the matter of education. So what is it that truly matters? What is the currency which unites all schools and prevails through every educational epoch? Sometimes this is not always clear and with so much shift and upheaval in our education system at present one fears the answer to the question "What is it that truly matters?" is in danger of being lost or forgotten.

Fear not! What matters and has always mattered is the quality of the experience each child has at school. Teaching matters and at BFS we want our teachers to be the best they can be; not for Ofsted, not for the Department for Education, not for our governors, nor for you our parents, or for me, but for the simple fact that children will succeed if they have great teachers. So perhaps my analogy with the USA is not sufficient. The common currency which ought to unite Free Schools should also be that which unites all schools, state and private: great teachers for great students.

In what has been a testing week in testing times, what truly matters is all of us at BFS striving to be the best we can be, staff and students alike.
