#### **Words from the Headteacher**

We have a huge array of after school clubs taking place at Bristol Free School catering for a wide range of interests. They are a true and worthwhile extension of the School's curriculum run by staff and attended by students on a voluntary basis. Students and staff recognise the benefit of such activities which epitomise all we are trying to achieve at BFS. Normally I would not single out any particular activity or club but I would like to share my experiences of BFS's Model United Nations club (MUN) as I feel it represents what is great about our extracurricular programme.

I drove the School minibus to Churchill Academy in North Somerset yesterday so that Elliot Smith, Charlie Symons, Jack Payne, Dan Whetton, Omar Khecha, Nathan John, Martin Kiss, James Beggs, Joel Grimmer and Celeste Silcox could, under the guidance of Miss Huzzey, participate in their first MUN conference. Our students had been learning debating techniques and the role of the United Nations during their MUN sessions. However, they had not, until yesterday, participated in a formal MUN conference. A typical conference requires students to employ a variety of communication and critical thinking skills in order to represent the policies of their country. These skills include public speaking, group communication, research, policy analysis, active listening, negotiating, conflict resolution, note taking, and technical writing. I am not sure what our students were expecting but our intrepid band of debaters found themselves in the company of 10 Churchill Academy 6<sup>th</sup> form students (most of whom are applying to Oxbridge). The 6<sup>th</sup> formers led them through a number of UN resolutions considering women's rights and a crisis resolution in response to a pandemic in the Middle East. To say that our ten held their own is an understatement; I am extremely proud of our students who not only engaged in the various debates but were fine ambassadors for the School. What I witnessed yesterday is typical of all which is taking place across the range of after school clubs on offer at BFS.

I know that our students were inspired by their experience. However, the two hours we spent at Churchill Academy, entirely in the hands of people under the age of 19, proved beyond doubt that our young people (be they part of BFS or Churchill Academy) are doing us proud, as they are in basketball, comic book philosophy, study club, science club – and the list goes on. So thank you to staff and students for all the time and effort put in to rich experiences inside and outside the taught curriculum; long may this continue.
