

Words from the Headteacher

I don't know if it's because I recently reached a significant birthday milestone, or simply because life at Bristol Free School is so busy and exciting, but it feels as though time has accelerated this year. We have now reached term 6 and the summer holiday is tantalisingly within reach. However, there are hurdles to be cleared between now and the revitalising promise of beach holidays or lazy afternoons in parks and botanical gardens. All of our energies in school are focused on the preparation for the Sixth Form, both in physical terms and all of the wider aspects which coalesce to create an outstanding institution. We are working with our colleagues across the Trust to ensure that each subject area is ready for launch.
