Bebras Computational Thinking Competition 2020 Results

567 KS3 students took part in the Bebras Challenge 2020 and the results are in!

- 72 students have been awarded the **Gold Award** putting them in the Top 10% nationally and they have been invited to participate in the Oxford University Computing Challenge in February 2021
- 141 students achieved a **Distinction** putting them in the Top 25% nationally
- 147 students achieved a Merit putting them in the Top 50% nationally
- 3 students have achieved Best in School with two of these achieving full marks. This puts them in the Top 60 in their age
 group which is a phenomenal achievement considering 68584 Juniors and 123211 Intermediate challengers took part!


COPING WITH CORONAVIRUS



- 5. You can access your work as well as use key packages such as:

- 6. To move the cursor you can use the gamepad or plug in a USB mouse.

She perpetuates anti-feminist narrative of the time, but can be seen as proto-feminist as Chaucer challenges the deas of the famale stereotype.



Well done for starting Term 3 so positively!





Notes will help you remember lessons as you watch them. It will also be useful for reviewing later.




DO ONE THING AT A TIME
